Conditions of entry are important—especially concerning the kingdom of heaven. The Bible is clear about the problem of humanity in our natural state: we are dead, blind, and enslaved due to sin. The solution God offers is salvation through Jesus Christ. But how can we be saved? The Bible teaches that salvation comes from turning away from sin toward Christ as Savior.

Key Terms

repentance

the act of turning *from sin* with godly remorse and to *God* out of love and reverence for Him

salvation

the reality of being rescued from sin's penalty upon one's genuine profession of faith, from sin's power through the enabling of God's Spirit, and from sin's presence upon entering Christ's company

Salvation is an essential prerequisite to discipleship. Before we can follow Jesus, we must know Him as our Savior. The purpose of this lesson is to help you grasp how God works to bring His people to salvation.

Is that all the Bible is, though—a classic book? Why bother with it? In answer to this question, Alistair examines 2 Timothy, teaching us that the Bible is central to all we do as Christians because it is the means through which God speaks to us.



Who is Jesus? Since His incarnation, people have confused and disparaged the identity of the Son of God. These two qualities exist without conflict or division and affirm His authority over life and death. In a world full of misguided notions about the identity of Jesus, it is only by looking to Scripture that we can understand the truth about Him.



The sacraments are outward, visible signs of inward, invisible grace—but we must not confuse the sign with the thing signified! Alistair helps us to distinguish between the symbols of baptism and the Lord's Supper and the realities to which they point. These ordinances are given to believers as commands from Christ in order to commemorate and proclaim Him. When we share in them, our faith is strengthened and our anticipation for Christ's return grows.

The sacraments have been given to the church so that He might be remembered and proclaimed in the church until He comes again. They must therefore never be downplayed or ignored. In this lesson, you will learn the important role that the sacraments play in your growth as a disciple of Jesus Christ.



When Jesus encountered the Samaritan woman at the well, His love and compassion for her provided a perfect model of evangelism. He began their conversation with a simple question—"Will you give

me a drink?"—and ended it with a life-changing revelation: He was (and is) the Messiah. Alistair challenges us to emulate Jesus' approach to sharing our faith. As he reminds us, once we have had an encounter with Christ, we cannot help but become evangelists ourselves.

As important as it is for us to learn, grow, and be engaged with the church body, this session teaches that Christ has also called His followers to make disciples of all nations. This means that we must not become inwardly focused but should aim to reach those who do not yet know Jesus as Lord and Savior.



Note: Quotation marks around the answer indicate that it is a direct quote from Alistair's message. All other answers are summaries of Alistair's teaching.

Session 01

Fill in the Blank

- **01.** "Salvation is not <u>by</u> works, but it is <u>for</u> works."

- **02.** "No. If that'd been the case, then Jesus Christ never need to have died upon the cross." Reread Ephesians 2:8-10.

- **02.** "To become a Christian, trusting in what Jesus has done on the cross as our only basis for acceptance with God, will involve at least these three elements: One, acknowledging that I am absolutely helpless and cannot rely on any righteousness of my own ... secondly, believing that Jesus has died and has provided the very gift of righteousness that I've just admitted that I need; and thirdly, that on the strength of that I must then cast myself upon His mercy."

Scripture needs to be interpreted dynamically, being considered in its own time and context, placed in the framework of the whole purpose of Scripture, and then applied to our own lives.
